Solo Boater Weather & Conditions Guide & Checklist

Use the full-route forecast and predetermined limits to make a conservative solo go/no-go decision.

Why this checklist matters

A solo operator has no one aboard to take over when conditions deteriorate or fatigue increases. Weather therefore deserves a larger safety margin than the operator might choose with competent crew aboard.

Conditions you may comfortably handle with competent crew aboard may not be conditions you choose to handle alone. Check the full planned route and time period, not only the conditions visible at the launch point.

This reference does not prescribe universal wind, wave, current, temperature, or visibility limits. Appropriate limits depend on the craft, operator, route, experience, exposure, and actual conditions.

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What to think about

Review the complete weather picture

Review the current forecast, applicable advisories and warnings, wind and gusts, waves or seas, thunderstorm risk, visibility, fog, air temperature, water temperature, and daylight. Add tides and currents wherever they affect the trip.

Use official NOAA/NWS information and other authoritative local sources. FPW Marine Weather can help organize weather review in the trip-planning workflow, but no single display replaces operator judgment or current official warnings.

Consider the entire route

Conditions can differ between the launch, open water, a river reach, a shoreline exposed to wind, and the return leg. Consider how the timing of the trip changes wind, current, tide, daylight, and exposure.

For paddlecraft, an offshore wind, current, tidal flow, or building waves can make the return much harder than the outbound leg. Larger boats also face route-specific visibility, maneuvering, and fatigue demands.

Set turn-back limits before departure

Decide in advance which conditions would cause you to cancel, turn back, shorten the trip, or choose a protected alternative. Predetermined limits reduce the influence of schedule pressure after the trip has started.

Key things to remember

- Check current official forecasts, advisories, and warnings.
- Evaluate conditions along the entire route and return period.
- Use craft-, operator-, and route-specific conservative limits.
- Decide what will trigger a turn-back or cancellation before leaving.

Weather and environment checklist

Use this checklist before departure. Marking an item does not replace the operator's responsibility to confirm what is appropriate and required for the actual vessel, activity, location, and conditions.

- ☐ I checked the current marine or local forecast.
- ☐ I checked applicable advisories and warnings.
- ☐ I checked expected wind.
- ☐ I checked expected gusts.
- ☐ I checked waves or seas where applicable.
- ☐ I checked thunderstorm risk.
- ☐ I checked visibility and fog risk.
- ☐ I checked tide where applicable.
- ☐ I checked current where applicable.
- ☐ I considered water temperature.
- ☐ I considered air temperature and exposure.
- ☐ I have enough daylight for the planned trip or am properly prepared for darkness.
- ☐ Conditions along the entire planned route remain within my conservative solo limits.
- ☐ I have decided in advance what conditions would cause me to turn back or cancel.
